The Night of Lights in Regensburg Cathedral

with the Marienrealschule Cham

A small group of pupils from the Marienrealschule set off with their school chaplain Johann Staudner to celebrate the «Night of Lights» in the cathedral. Even the German Federal Railways (half an hour late) could not prevent the event. In the cathedral, they were allocated one of the scarce seats in the choir room shortly before the start (7.30 pm). Most of the young people set up camp on the floor of the cathedral with blankets, sleeping mats and sleeping bags.

The BDKJ and the Evangelical Youth

of Regensburg have been organising a «Night of Lights» in Regensburg Cathedral for many years. This year's motto was: «God is bigger than our hearts». Based on the prayers in Taizé, the night is organised with songs from Taizé. These songs consist of a simple text, usually just one line. This is sung again and again - easy to remember and easy to join in. The repetition has a meditative character, you come to rest and reflect on the essentials - prayer with God. The meditative atmosphere invited people to sing along, listen and reflect. The altar area was decorated

with lights and cloths, there were no bright spotlights. Each guest was given a light, which created a unique atmosphere in the cathedral. Our pupils were able to immerse themselves in this special atmosphere: Candlelight that allows you to calm down. Silence that makes you feel carried. Songs that make the soul vibrate. Prayers that pray for peace, reconciliation and community. The group arrived back in Cham at

around 11.00 pm, somewhat tired but full of wonderful impressions.

Sources and Streams: Marist Symposium 2023

The first Marist Patrimony Symposium was held in Rome from 4 - 8th December 2023. The purpose of the Symposium was to bring together Marist scholars, writers, and directors of Marist mission and life, to share research, experiences, and ideas. The Symposium enabled people to meet, to establish relationships, and foster new scholarship, and to provide a focus for research to be shared and discussed in an international Marist context. The symposium also created a space to nurture new and potential researchers writers and to encourage intergenerational links.

The Marist spiritual family was represented by Brothers and lay people, and members of the Society of Mary, with whom we share significant parts of our foundation story. Participants came from twenty-five different countries, including Kenya, Guatemala, Brazil, France, Italy, Hong Kong, Madagascar, France, Spain, Australia, USA, Scotland, Vietnam, Rwanda, Zambia, Ghana, Côte D'Ivoire, Lebanon, Sri Lanka, Bolivia, Chile, Fiji, Colombia, and Argentina. There were Marist Fathers from Ireland, USA,

Germany, and New Zealand, including Fr Larsen, the Superior General of the Fathers. Two Marist Sisters were present. Twenty presenters from different parts of the Marist world provided interesting and stimulating sessions in the course of the week.

Br. Michael Green began with a presentation on the Christocentric sources of Marist spirituality. He said he was concerned that in recent years Fr. Champagnat often seemed to be the focus of our Marist spirituality rather than Christ himself. He contrasted the tradition passed on to Fr. François (Superior General from 1839 - 1860) from Fr. Champagnat, with the very different ascetical spirituality that was promoted by Brother Louis Marie, who was Superior General from 1860 until 1879, and his successors, and which was influential in the Marist Institute until the 1960s. Br. André Lanfrey in his presentation, reinterpreted significant where he aspects of the Marist Foundation story, also pointed to Fr. François as a more authentic interpreter of the Champagnat tradition. He also explored the complex relationship between the brothers and the Society of Mary which were not fully

resolved until the 1870s. We are indebted to these two Brothers who have used their research skills to reclaim the Champagnat tradition which has been hidden behind the ascetical and moralistic accretions of later generations.

Br. Antonio Estaún delved into the writings of Fr. François to reveal the personality behind this often elusive figure. He also explored the people and sources that inspired the thinking and writing of Brother Basilio Rueda, who was Superior General from 1967 – 85, at a time of great change in the Church and the Institute. Other presenters examined the Marist tradition from the perspective of a spirituality of the heart, moving from the dark night to a spirituality of light, and the need to move to interiority in our educational work.

Fr Alois Greiler SM asked if Fr. Jean-Claude Colin, founder of the Society of Mary, should be canonised. He noted that the cause of Fr Colin was often stalled due to lack of enthusiasm on the part of many members of the Society of Mary themselves. This presentation opened up the life and writings of Fr Colin to many participants. He left the question of Fr Colin's relationship with



Jeanne-Marie Chavoin in the air, saying it required further study. Jeanne Marie Chavoin, co-Foundress of the Marist Sisters, had a different vision for the lifestyle and apostolate of the Sisters, which involved working in villages to offer support to women and girls in a range of ways. Fr Colin, as was the case with so many nineteenth century bishops and male founders, wanted the sisters to be cloistered. Fr Colin imposed his own preferred candidate as leader of the Sisters, and Jeanne Marie-Chavoin was put aside. It was noted that this is a difficult history at a time when significant parts of the Church want to promote the leadership and involvement of women in the Church. This aspect of Fr. Colin's life has to be considered alongside his important insight about offering mercy in the manner of Mary as the preferred way to evangelise the «men of our time», which continues to be relevant today, his ability

to inspire the young priests who joined the Marist project, and the management of the Pacific mission from such a great distance.

Dr Michael Connolly from Coatbridge near Glasgow, a lecturer in Sport at Stirling University, gave two workshops based on his research into the life of Brother Walfrid, who founded Celtic football club in order to raise money to provide meals for poor children in the East End of Glasgow. Michael's engaging manner and the quality of his presentation made this workshop a popular choice, and many people have made contact with Michael to share more stories about the involvement of Brothers in sport in other parts of the world. Michael said that the most interesting question he received was whether or not Brother Walfrid had played for Celtic!

Br. Colin Chalmers and Dorotea Cinanni, the Archivist, led two workshops to

«open the treasures of the archives» to the participants. Both workshops were popular and one was oversubscribed and had to be divided into two groups. I offered a presentation entitled, «I don't like teachers who are executioners: Safeguarding in Marist origins and recent developments». The quotation is taken from Fr. Champagnat, and I used the presentation to demonstrate that Fr. Champagnat was ahead of his time in his policies and practice regarding the protection of children.

As well as benefiting from the research and study of the presenters, the Symposium offered an opportunity for social gatherings, conversations, networking and encouragement for each other. Researchers often work alone, and sometimes do not benefit from the interest and encouragement of other Marists. The shadow side of our fine Marist tradition for pragmatism and practicality is that taking time for historical research may seem either a luxury, a quaint obsession, or of rather arcane interest to some of our confrères and colleagues. The Symposium allowed «kindred spirits» to share their enthusiasm for Marist history, charism and tradition, and to support each other in our conviction that awareness and understanding of the «sources and streams» of our tradition can be life-giving and can illuminate new paths for mission and Marist life.

Br. Michael Green said at the end of the Symposium that there are plans for a second Symposium in 1825, the year of the General Chapter and the bicentenary of the opening of the Hermitage. Hopefully, the next Symposium will be an opportunity for further sharing of research, writing and initiatives that open up and explore our heritage, with new presenters – including more women and voices from more parts of the Marist world – for the benefit of the whole Institute.










Cross listing all countries with Marist presence











Marist Leaders at Marian College Dublin

Our Marist leaders have been busy this year so far. From helping our first years on what could have been a daunting trip back to school for them this August, to our annual trip to L'Hermitage, our Year 1, and Year 2 leaders have been working hard to set goals and tasks for the year ahead.

Our first task of the year was to welcome the new first years back to school in September. Marist leaders were on hand to assist first years as they navigated their first few weeks around the school. Finding classrooms, working out lockers, and following new timetables can all be daunting tasks for young students. As leaders we were on hand to help the First Year Year head to settle the new students into the Marian family.

From this we have taken our role even further by starting up a mentor programme with the group. Each first-year student has been allocated a Marist leader to act in a mentorship capacity. We have been acting in an almost big brother role around the school. The aim is to check in with the students on a regular basis, to see how they are doing. This was particularly important around the time of Christmas exams. This was the first time the first-year students had ever experienced exams in such an environment. As mentors we discussed the idea of creating study timetables, reducing exam stress, getting enough rest etc.

This year we have decided to work closely with Pieta house. In Ireland Pieta House is a charity organisation that works closely with those who have been impacted by suicide. Mental health and suicide awareness is something which is incredibly important to us in Marian College, and it is one of the reasons why we have applied for Pieta's Amber Flag which is awarded to schools for their support and promotion positive mental





health and well-being. As part of this initiative, we will be running a positive mental health week. As well as these events we also plan to participate in the now worldwide «Darkness into Light» walk in May in aid of suicide prevention and support.

This Christmas we have continued with what has become our annual food drive appeal. We run this

event in aid of the local Saint Vincent De Paul Charity. We ask students and staff to bring in non-perishable foods that will be donated to those less fortunate living in the area over the Christmas period.


This year we have also decided to run a
